

- Read the press release
- Interview 1-2 spokespeople
- Write it up
- Send it to your section editor
- They'll send it to the news editor
- They'll send it to the sub-editor
- Published!



MEDIA PYRAMID



Title

A good title attracts the attention and provides an insight into the article!

1. Essential information

Information that provides the main details of the article. This information provides answers to the 5 magic W questions: Who, what, why, when and where.

2. Important information

Information that expands on the essential information (remember that, while this information is important, the message should be clear without it). Here you can include quotes and other sources of information.

3. Less important information

Information that adds to the message. It would be good for the reader to have this information, in case they wish to inquire further. Links to outside resources, that contain additional useful information.

WHAT ARE THE MOTIVATIONS OF DIFFERENT MEDIA?

CRAAP TEST... SOME CONTEXT



Prospects' head of higher education intelligence, Charlie Ball, provides his regular update on the impact of the COVID-19 recession on the graduate labour market

C	 Currency: The timeliness of the information. When was the information published or posted? Revised or updated? Does your topic require current information, or will older sources work as well? 	
R	 Relevance: The importance of the information for your needs. Does the information relate to your topic or answer your question? Who is the intended audience? / an appropriate level? 	1
A	 Authority: The source of the information. Who is the author/publisher/source/sponsor? What are the author's credentials or organizational affiliations? Is the author qualified to write on the topic? / contact information? 	
A	 Accuracy: The reliability, truthfulness and correctness of the content. Where does the information come from? / supported by evidence? Has the information been reviewed or refereed? Does the language or tone seem unbiased and free of emotion? 	
P	 Purpose: The reason the information exists. What is the purpose of the information? Is it to inform, teach, sell, entertain or persuade? Does the point of view appear objective and impartial? Are there political, religious, institutional or personal biases?

Civil Service Code

- Integrity: putting the obligations of public service above personal interest
- Honesty: being truthful and open
- Objectivity: basing your decisions on rigorous analysis of the evidence
- Impartiality: acting according to the merits of the case and serving equally well governments of all persuasions

- The urgent Monday morning briefing for a Minister
- Developing policy to promote economic resilience
- Supporting the passage of the National Security and Investment Bill
- Designing, building and delivering a new digital service



Civil Service Behaviours

Applying academic practice to a civil service role

- Spend time drafting (and redrafting) behaviour examples c. 250 words
- Unless directly relevant to a role, emphasize processes that enable research rather than the content
- Consider the variety of skills you have gained beyond research / analysis
- Assessment centres will assess your skills using real-life policy issues
